

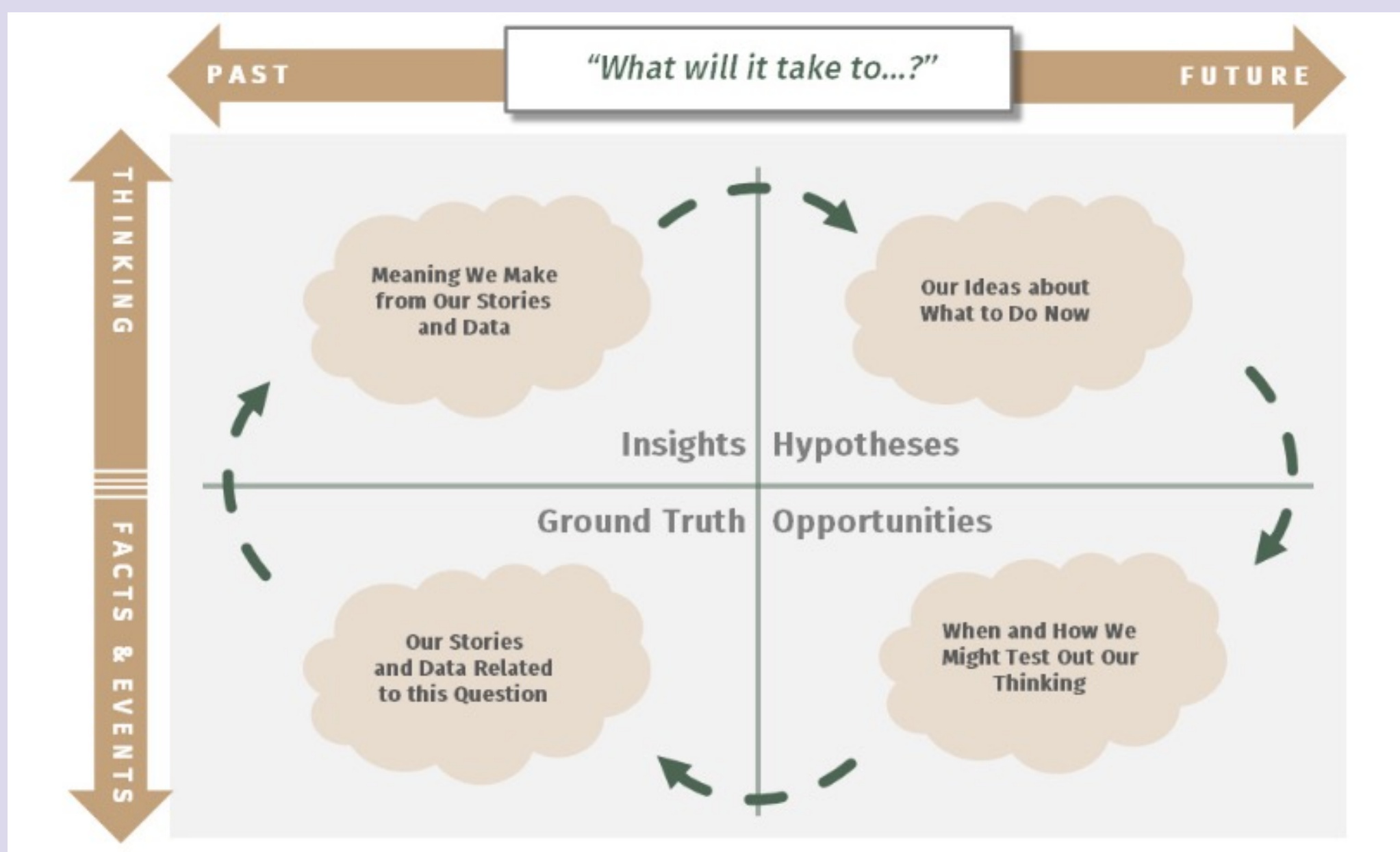

Lessons Learned



Present data in an organized & digestible way

Graphs, charts, quotes related to defined themes



Facilitate the conversation in a way that privileges all experiences and perspectives

Make space for story sharing and collaborative reflection



Emphasize that the discussion is driving toward action

Ask participants to identify concrete opportunities to apply



Clarify expectations of success

Was the same group of people interpreting data involved in defining success?



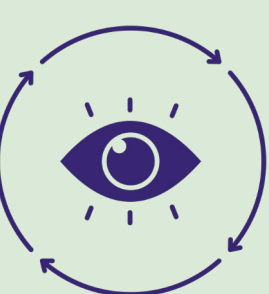
Review progress against objectives

Allow for the evolution of objectives where needed



Use interactive ways to engage with the data

Colors, large visuals, walking around, refreshments!



Compile a visual summary to use in continued work

Seeking continued engagement and clear next steps

Strategy 1: Increase the capacity of groups in food security in our community.		Level of Progress Towards Goal
a. Hire a paid director and community organizer for Org A.		●
b. Provide cost sharing for a FoodCorps member at our public schools.		●
d. Create a centrally located choice pantry within the city.		●
e. Support pantry clients with nutrition education.		●
f. Support Org B in development of Network-wide emergency plan and communicate plan to pantry clients.		●
g. Created a coordinated effort for residents to receive food subsidy support.		●
h. Form group of trained SNAP screeners that serves the community and shares best practices.		●
i. Expand on collaborations with grocery stores for food subsidy program outreach.		●
